2025 Overview:

The Social Association is a non-profit humanitarian organization dedicated to improving the well-being of vulnerable communities through integrated, people-centered interventions. Guided by humanitarian principles and a strong commitment to dignity, the Association works to address urgent needs while strengthening community resilience in the face of ongoing social and economic challenges.

Throughout 2025, the Association expanded its presence across Mount Lebanon and South Lebanon, responding to increasing demands for essential services. Programming was designed to be flexible and context-responsive, allowing the Association to deliver timely assistance while adapting to evolving community needs and resource constraints.

The Association's approach is grounded in a multi-sectoral model that combines health care, food security, protection, education, WASH, and livelihoods support. By linking immediate humanitarian assistance with longer-term recovery and capacity-building efforts, the Association aims to reduce vulnerability, prevent negative coping mechanisms, and promote sustainable outcomes for individuals and households.

Strong community engagement and partnerships remain central to the Association's work. Interventions are implemented in close coordination with local authorities, community leaders, and service providers to ensure relevance, accountability, and equitable access, particularly for the most at-risk groups, including children, women, persons with disabilities, and the elderly.

This report presents an overview of the Association's activities and achievements during 2025, highlighting the scope of its interventions and the collective impact of its multi-sectoral response. It reflects the Association's continued commitment to transparency, accountability, and effective humanitarian action.

1.. Health Sector

Health interventions constituted the largest component of the Association's programming in 2025, reaching a total of **46,386** beneficiaries through facility-based services, outreach, emergency response, and system strengthening.

The Iklim Primary Health Care Center provided comprehensive primary health services to 58,426 individuals, covering consultations, diagnostics, and essential treatments. Outreach services through the Mobile Clinic extended care to 3,094 beneficiaries in remote and underserved areas.

Emergency preparedness and rapid response were reinforced through the Emergency & Relief Corps, supporting 405 individuals, while the Medical Coverage Fund enabled 284 patients to access secondary and tertiary medical care. The distribution of medical equipment supported treatment and recovery for 123 beneficiaries.

Preventive health and capacity-building initiatives complemented direct service delivery. Health awareness seminars reached 1,167 community members, paramedic skills development courses trained 60 responders, support to medical centers benefited 388 individuals, and blood donation campaigns engaged 25 donors, strengthening emergency health preparedness.

2. Food Security and Nutrition Sector

Food security and basic needs assistance reached a total of 13,255 beneficiaries, addressing both chronic and seasonal food insecurity.

The distribution of relief parcels, including food parcels, children's kits, and women's kits, supported 2,327 individuals, while the "Al-Maida" community kitchen provided hot meals to 5 highly vulnerable beneficiaries.

Seasonal assistance constituted a major share of food security programming. Through Ramadan Al-Khayr, the Association reached 5,173 beneficiaries with food parcels, hot meals, and Eid clothing. During Adha Al-Khayr, 5,000 individuals received meat parcels. Additional orphan-related food and cash assistance projects supported 750 beneficiaries, contributing to household food stability.

3. Protection Sector

Protection and social support interventions reached 4,334 beneficiaries, focusing on child protection, disability inclusion, women's mental health, and dignity-centered assistance.

Through monthly orphan sponsorships, 3,283 orphans received sustained financial and social support throughout the year. Persons with disabilities benefited from mobility aids, cash assistance, and specialized items, reaching 25 individuals.

Women-centered protection programming included psychological support services, assisting 90 women through structured psychosocial interventions. Community-based awareness and educational sessions addressing protection, social cohesion, and health-related themes engaged 116 participants.

In line with humanitarian principles and cultural values, the Association ensured dignified burial support, honoring 218 deceased individuals and supporting affected families.

4. Education Sector

Education interventions supported 685 beneficiaries, addressing non-formal education, language learning, and access to higher education opportunities, and more than 176 Awareness & Educational Sessions.

The Association supported religious education in schools, benefiting 285 students, while Turkish language education programs reached 214 learners. In addition, assistance in obtaining scholarships for students in Turkey enabled 10 students to pursue higher education opportunities.

Complementary educational and cultural engagement activities contributed to broader learning and awareness outcomes among participating communities.

5. Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene WASH Sector

Water, sanitation, and hygiene interventions reached 390 beneficiaries in 2025, addressing hygiene needs and access to safe water.

The distribution of women's kits and hygiene kits supported 390 beneficiaries, contributing to improved personal hygiene, dignity, and disease prevention among vulnerable populations.

6. Livelihoods & Community Support

Livelihoods and economic empowerment interventions reached 80 beneficiaries, contributing to income generation and local economic recovery.

Through community employment opportunities, 75 individuals accessed short-term employment and income support. Additionally, support to local small businesses benefited 5 entrepreneurs, additionally creating long-term job to 5 individuals in the Water Treatment Plan, strengthening household livelihoods and community-level economic activity.

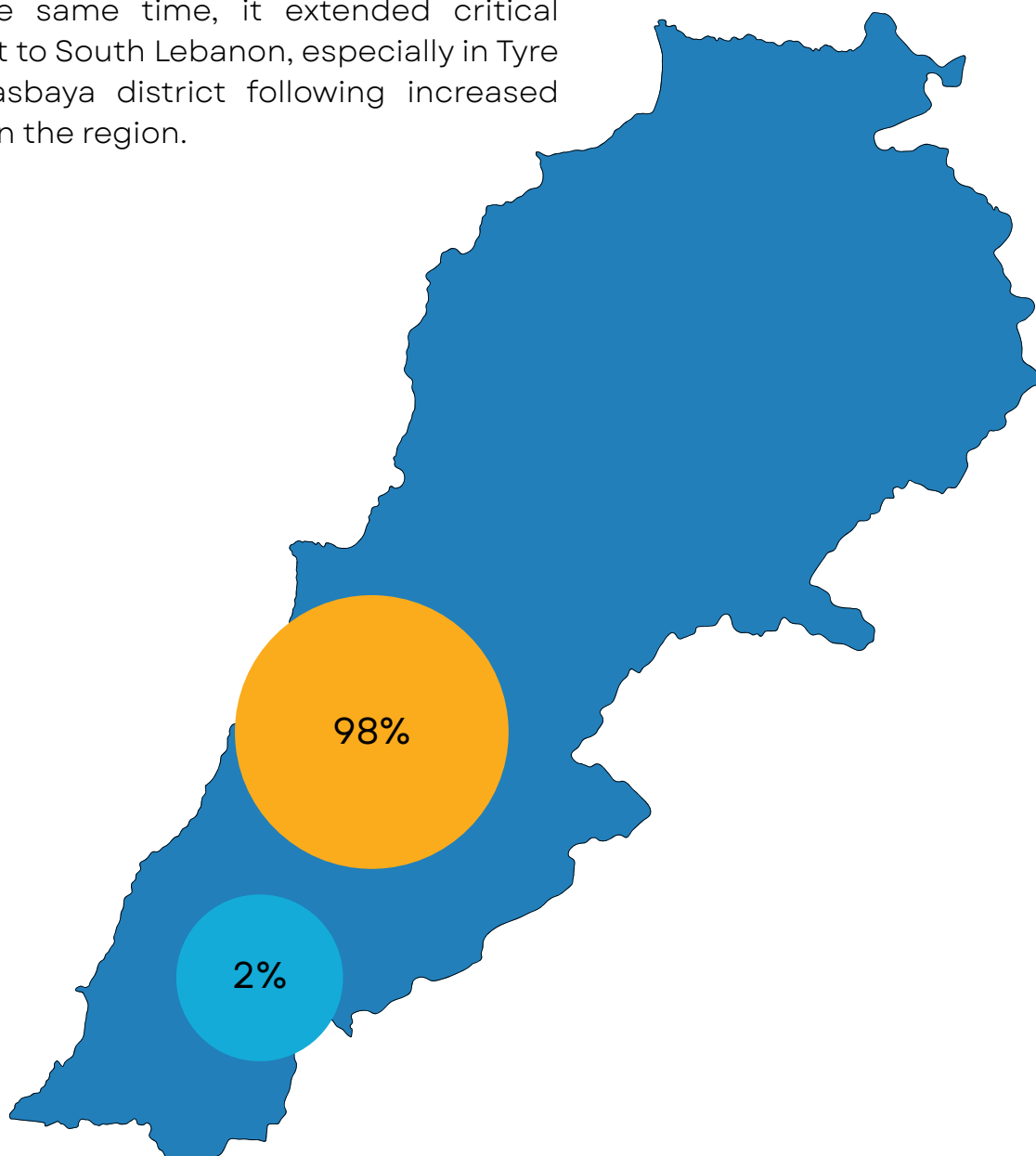
Overall Impact:

Across all sectors, the Association's 2025 response reflected a holistic and integrated approach, combining humanitarian assistance with protection, education, and resilience-building measures. By reaching tens of thousands of beneficiaries across multiple sectors, the Association addressed immediate needs while reinforcing community capacity and dignity.

Geographic Distribution of Assistance – 2025

During 2025, The Social Association concentrated the majority of its humanitarian and development interventions in Mount Lebanon, particularly in the Iqlim al-Kharroub area, where the organization operates several permanent facilities.

At the same time, it extended critical support to South Lebanon, especially in Tyre and Hasbaya district following increased needs in the region.
